Demographics

2016 Chief

- N=157
- 6th grade
- Age
 - 47% were 11 years old,
 - 47% were 12 years old, and
 - 6% were 13 years old
- Gender
 - 47% male
 - 53% female
- Ethnicity
 - Native= 75%
 - Hispanic=24%
 - African American= 4%
 - White= 8%

2017 JFK

- N=117
- 6th grade
- Age
 - 23% were 11 years old,
 - 70% were 12 years old, and
 - 8% were 13 years old
- Gender
 - 53% male
 - 47% female
- Ethnicity
 - Native= 53%
 - Hispanic=30.8%
 - African American= 2%
 - White= 10.3%

Substance Perception and Use

- 96% (2017) vs 90% (2016) of the youth said their parents think it's wrong for them to drink alcohol
- 92% (2017) vs 83% (2016) of the youth think it's wrong for someone their age to drink alcohol.
- 91% (2017) vs 96% (2016) reported haven't had alcohol (lifetime)
- 93% (2017) vs 95% (2016) reported **no** marijuana use (lifetime)

Past 30-day Use

- 95% (2017) vs 98% (2016) reported **not** smoking cigarettes within the past 30-days
- 100% reported **no** alcohol within past 30-days (same as in 2016)
- 95% reported **no** marijuana use in the past 30-days (same as in 2016)
- 100% reported **no** past-30 day prescription pain killer use (same as in 2016)

Intent

- 95% (2017) vs 96% (2016) of youth said they will **not** smoke anytime soon
- 94% (2017) vs 97% (2016) said they will **not** or probably will not smoke in the next year

Access

2016 Chief

- Alcohol Access
 - At a party
 - Someone under 21 purchased it
 - Took it from home
- Tobacco Access
 - Parent or guardian provided it
 - Someone under 18 purchased it
 - Obtained some other way
- Prescription pain killer access
 - Doctor or dentist
 - Family member

2017 JKF

- Alcohol Access
 - Parent or guardian gave or bought
 - I bought it at a store
 - Someone under age 18 bought or gave it to me
- Tobacco Access
 - I bought it at a store
- Prescription pain killer access
 - Doctor or dentist
 - Family member

Use on School Property

- 100% (2017) vs 99% (2016) reported **no** smoking cigarettes
- 99% (2017) vs 100% (2016) reported **no** snuff or dip use
- 98% (2017) vs 100% (2016) reported **no** alcohol use
- 99% reported **no** marijuana use (same as 2016)
- 98% (2017) vs 100% (2016) reported **no** prescription drug use

Offered or Sold

- 4% (2017) vs 9% (2016) reported past-year: offered, sold, or given illegal drugs on school property
- 4% (2017) vs 3% (2016) reported past-year: offered, sold, or given prescription drugs to get high.
